The Great Fifty Days Wisdom and Power for the Church

The Great Fifty Days extend from Easter to Pentecost (April 20-June 8 this year). The biblical basis for this season in the worship life of the church is found in the Book of Acts. There are forty days between the Resurrection of Jesus from the dead and the Ascension of Jesus.

"After his suffering, Jesus presented himself alive to them by many convincing proofs, appearing to them during forty days and speaking about the kingdom of God." (Acts 1:3). "But you will receive power when the Holy Spirit has come upon you, and you will be my witnesses in Jerusalem, in all Judea and Samaria, and to the ends of the earth." When he had said this, as they were watching, he (Jesus) was lifted up, and a cloud took him out of their sight. (Acts 1:8-9).

Ten days later – the 50 th day after resurrection – the disciples experienced the promised outpouring and empowerment of the Holy Spirit while gathered in Jerusalem. This was the day of Pentecost (which means fifty days). Pentecost (Shavuot) was already established as a festival for the Jewish people – 50 days after the first day of Passover. Pentecost celebrates the giving of the Torah (the first five books of the Hebrew Bible) to Moses at Mount Sinai. It also celebrates the harvest of the first fruits of the wheat harvest.

"When the day of Pentecost had come, they were all together in one place. And suddenly from heaven there came a sound like the rush of a violent wind, and it filled the entire house where they were sitting. Divided tongues, as of fire, appeared among them, and a tongue rested on each of them. All of them were filled with the Holy Spirit and began to speak in other languages, as the Spirit gave them ability."

(Acts 2:1-4).

The Great Fifty Days is about time and timing. They remind us that the mission of the church is rooted and grounded in the wisdom and power of God in Jesus Christ. Even though the disciples had been with Jesus for years, they were still in need of further insight into the Kingdom of God. And even though they were instructed by the Lord, the disciples were still in need of divine empowerment for the mission. Wisdom without power was not sufficient. Power without wisdom is reckless and dangerous. Wisdom & Power is the combination of gifts that the Risen Lord provides for the church during The Great Fifty Days. As Peace Haven Baptist Church moves forward on mission with and for the Lord Jesus Christ, let's remember the prescription provided by the Lord for His church has not changed. Wisdom and Power are both required for the mission and we must continually seek the Lord for both.

Love CDC is committed to serving all individuals living in our community, regardless of their race, ethnicity, gender, gender identity, sexual orientation, age, social class, physical ability or attributes, religious or ethical values system, national origin or political beliefs. No one visiting the Love Center is refused service because of who they are or what they believe. Food items that are requested are Black eyed peas, Oatmeal, Grits, Canned meats/stews such as Brunswick Stew, Mac'n Cheese and canned or dried Beans. A shopping list is available on the table outside of the sanctuary, Contributions can be placed in the basket on the bookcase in the hallway.

Honoring Juneteenth: A Celebration of Freedom and Resilience

Juneteenth, observed on June 19th, marks a pivotal moment in American history—the day in 1865 when Union Major General Gordon Granger arrived in Galveston, Texas, to announce and enforce the emancipation of enslaved African Americans. Although President Abraham Lincoln had issued the Emancipation Proclamation over two years earlier, on January 1, 1863, many enslaved people in Texas remained in bondage due to the state's resistance and geographical distance from Union influence.

Texas was among the last Confederate strongholds to surrender, making the arrival of Union troops a powerful symbol of delayed—but eventual—liberation. The proclamation itself followed earlier legislative efforts like the Confiscation Acts of 1861 and 1862, which aimed to undermine slavery in the Confederacy and encouraged voluntary emancipation by offering compensation to slaveholders—efforts largely ignored by secessionist states.

The first Juneteenth celebration took place on June 19, 1866, under the name "Jubilee Day." It quickly gained momentum across the South as a time for formerly enslaved people to gather, reflect, and rejoice. In the 1870s and 1880s, Juneteenth festivities included barbecues, rodeos, music, and worship services. Amidst growing attempts to suppress Black freedom and culture, community leaders in Houston, Texas, purchased "Emancipation Park" as a safe and permanent place for these celebrations.

More than 150 years later, Juneteenth was officially recognized as a federal holiday on June 19, 2021. Today, it is honored across the United States with festivals, educational events, parades, and moments of reflection—a testament to the enduring spirit of freedom, resilience, and community.

Let us continue to remember and uplift the legacy of Juneteenth as we work toward justice, equality, and unity for all.

Walking The Prayer Labyrinth

The PHBC Prayer Labyrinth is located adjacent to the columbarium/prayer garden on the Archer Road side of the church property. The Prayer Labyrinth was constructed in 2022. The octagonal design of Peace Haven's labyrinth is rooted in church history. Many baptistries in early Christian communities were octagonal and were symbols of resurrection, renewal, and regeneration in Jesus Christ. The Peace Haven labyrinth also faces east. This connects us with the dawning of a new day and the promise of new beginnings in God. The labyrinth is not a maze. There are no tricks. There is no deception. Labyrinths symbolize our journey in God. There are twists. There are turns. There are directional changes. But the singular path leads to the center a place of resting in God. The Labyrinth area is available to the whole community every day. Take time to explore walking the prayer path on your own or at a scheduled time. Rev.
